

M. A. C. Scoring Machine Is Again Running Smoothly

AKRON IS MEAT FOR THE AGGIES

Macklin's Great Scoring Machine Runs Smoothly Throughout, Turning Out Better Than a Point Per Minute.

FORWARD PASSES GIVE LOSERS ONLY TOUCHDOWN

In the Last Quarter a Substitute Backfield Piles on 28 Points More With Buckeye State Players Tuckered Out.

Special to The Free Press, East Lansing, Mich., October 31.—The Michigan Aggies showed some of their lost form this afternoon by defeating the University of Akron 15 to 6.

The "one score that the Ohio eleven did make was justly earned, for with the ball on the M. A. C. 45-yard line, Ross intercepted a forward pass and ran 30 yards to M. A. C.'s 15-yard line, where he was downed by Gideon Smith. Another pass, Palmer to W. Smith, took the ball over the Aggies' line for the touchdown. Palmer failed to kick goal.

The Aggie line was practically impenetrable to the Ohioans and they also found it hard to make any gains around ends, so they resorted to the forward pass, which netted them a considerable number of yards at times. On the other hand, the Farmers found it an easy matter to break through the Akron line and some of the largest gains ever made on the local field were made in this way. Not once during the entire game were the Aggies forced to punt in order to get out of danger.

The Regular Lineup.

The regular lineup started the game with the exception of Hammill, who started for Hewitt Miller, and the touchdowns came in such rapid order that Coach Macklin started in to substitute right at the beginning of the game. Hutton, the Ludington lad, went in for Blacklock, but was soon replaced by Coryell. Then Loveland went in for Straight and the Farmer machine started to score at the rate of better than a point a minute.

During the second quarter with White substituted for Vandervoort and "Dutch" Oviatt for Blake Miller, an additional 14 points were recorded, but the big feature of the day came in the fourth quarter when, with a complete reserve backfield consisting of Fick at quarter, Cobb at left half, Hammill at right half and Jack O'Callahan at fullback, 26 points were run up against the Ohio team. In the line during that quarter Childs played for a time at left end, Hutton for Vandervoort, at right guard, Brownfield for Straight, at left guard, Coryell for Blacklock, at right tackle, Chadlock at right end, Vaughn at center, only two regulars were in the lineup during this quarter and many were the cheers that were offered by the stands for the scrubs.

Cobb Shows Real Form.

Cobb, the Grand Rapids lad, was easily the star of the scrub aggregation, hitting the Akron line time and time again for large gains. Jack O'Callahan worked well at fullback the few minutes that he was in the game and the work of Hammill throughout the entire tilt met with the approval of the Aggie fans. The Putney youth was responsible for one of the touchdowns during the last quarter. Fick at quarter showed up to his usual form, being in the midst of every play and called his signals well. On a straight line plunge from the two-yard line he went over for a touchdown.

Loveland, at guard, played a good consistent game. The one feature of the Grand Rapids lad's playing was that very few plays got by him and on several occasions he broke through the opposing line and downed his men for losses.

Of the regulars Gideon Smith, the Aggies' tackle, together with Captain Carp Julian, was easily the star of the game. On one occasion after the Aggies had been penalized to their five-yard line Smith took the ball and ran 55 yards to the Akron three-yard line before he was downed.

At the opening of the next quarter Carp Julian took the ball to the one-yard line and followed it up on the next try for a touchdown. Throughout the game his work stood out strongly and he was one of the hardest men on the team to down.

Captain Carp Julian was an equal, if not more of a star than Smith, for of the eleven touchdowns made he was responsible for seven. He played a strong offensive game throughout the entire afternoon and hit the Akron line for large gains at every attempt. Blake Miller and Chadlock at ends showed up just as strong today as they did in the recent battle with the University of Michigan when they refused to allow their ends to be circled.

Deprato Does Good Work.

Jerry Deprato worked hard at half and did not appear to have much trouble in hitting the Akron line. Jerry was good on the forward pass and especially on one occasion when he received a pass from Carp Julian on the 15-yard line and went over for a touchdown.

Vaughn at center played fully up to his former standard and the Aggie fans could not imagine after watching his work this afternoon how the Nebraskans ever got by him as they did last Saturday.

During the time that Hammill was in the game he played up to his old form as did Blacklock, at right tackle, Vandervoort and Straight, the other two regulars, worked to the satisfaction of the Aggie fans.

The total number of forward passes tried by M. A. C. was 23, of which nine were completed for a total gain of 120 yards. The Akron team attempted 22 and managed to complete six for a total gain of 71 yards. M. A. C. was penalized 55 yards, while the Ohio eleven was only set back seven yards during the entire game.

In the first quarter Weeks received the ball on the 35-yard line, but Crisp and Weeks failed to gain and Palmer punted. The Ohioans lost the ball on downs. Hammill and Blake Miller each made five yards and Smith went around for another three.

Julian First to Score.

A series of small gains and a final dash of five yards by Julian netted the first touchdown. Crisp made five yards around the Aggies' left, but the Akron line lost the ball again on downs and the ball went over to the Aggies. Hammill took 12 yards around right end and Deprato another seven, followed by Blake Miller in a pretty run of 20 yards around the same flank. A combination of Smith, Julian and Blacklock, followed by a final plunge by Julian

resulted in the second touchdown. Deprato kicked goal. Palmer took up the forward pass and made 19 yards, but on a fumble the ball went over to the Aggies again. "Dutch" Miller made 25 yards around left end, Deprato 15 to the right and Hammill 15 through the line, with an additional two by Julian for the third touchdown. After a series of unsuccessful attempts to gain the Aggies again got the ball, Smith carried it the 95 yards to the Akron three-yard line. Julian came back in the second quarter and after a few plays made another touchdown. Not to be outdone, Deprato executed a successful forward pass and went over for a touchdown in short order. During the remainder of the quarter the Aggies failed to make further scores and in the third quarter they took it a little easier and recorded only seven points, for which Smith was responsible. The fourth quarter was the scrubs' inning, and 28 more points were registered.
