

FUMBLING MARS WIN OF AGGIES

Poor Play at Times Leads Rooters to Fear for Michigan Game Despite 56 to 0 Score Run Up on Carroll.

WORK OF SMITH IS THE ONE REDEEMING FEATURE

Fick is Big Offender in the "Gumming-up" Line—Four Passes Started by the Visitors Are Successful.

East Lansing, Mich., Oct. 16.—In a slow game in which "old army" tactics played an important part, Coach Macklin's Michigan Aggies rolled up a 56 to 0 score on the Carroll college eleven of Waukesha, Wis., on College field this afternoon.

The Aggies' work, with the exception of a few minutes before the close of the game, was very disappointing and had it not been for one Gideon Smith, the old colored boy who plays left tackle on Macklin's eleven, they might have gone to the final period with only a count of two.

Repeated fumbling by Fick, frequent violations of rules with penalties of from 5 to 20 yards and a general lack of team play marked the Aggies' work through three periods.

Show Only a Flash.

Only a flash of good work in the third quarter saved the Farmers in this period. They were forced to play nearly the entire 15 minutes in their own territory and at times within the shadows of their own goal posts.

In the fourth period the Aggies came to life and reeled off three touchdowns in rapid succession. It was only in this period that they showed any signs of strength that might cause any of Coach Fielding H. Yost's scouts who happened to be present at the game to present a report to their chief that would cause a bit of worry in the Wolverine camp.

The Aggies played a smashing game in this quarter and executed a couple of forward passes for a total of 35 yards each, both of which resulted in touchdowns.

It took the Aggies just three minutes to count in the opening quarter. After fumbling by Fick and a penalty and forced Deprato to kick, the Aggies again gained possession of the ball when Porlier, the Indian captain of the Wisconsin eleven, punted to Heubel, who ran the ball back 15 yards to the Aggies' 40-yard line. A couple of small gains through the line followed and Smith broke away for 35 yards. Heubel then counted on a run around end.

After the second kick-off the Aggies worked the ball down to Carroll's 30-yard line, where they lost the oval on a fumble by Fick.

Smith on the Job.

Smith, on the second play, intercepted a forward pass on Carroll's 40-yard line and, shaking off a couple of tacklers, crossed the goal for the second touchdown. A few moments later Heubel was guilty of the Aggies' third fumble, when he dropped the pigskin on Carroll's 40-yard line. Two plays, one a forward pass, Porlier to Atwood, placed the pigskin on the Aggies' 35-yard line as the quarter ended.

Captain Blake Miller did the rescuing stunt at the opening of the second period when he intercepted one of Porlier's passes on the Aggies' 25-yard line and ran to the 46-yard line before he was stopped. Jerry Deprato negotiated 35 yards more on a smash through the line. He carried the ball over on the third play. Two forward passes failed on the Aggies' next attempt with the ball. After an interchange of punts the Aggies obtained the ball in the center of the field, where Smith broke away for his third long run, going 50 yards for a touchdown.

Carroll Takes Big Brace.

The third quarter was one to make the Aggies' rooters sad. They saw their huskies whom they are counting on to down Michigan a week hence, all but outplayed by the diminutive Carroll.

Fick fumbled in the center of the field, giving Carroll the ball. Kuhlman dashed to the Aggies' 25-yard line, but a penalty for rough work brought Carroll back to its 45-yard mark.

With the Aggies in possession of the ball after Porlier had punted, Deprato made a 35-yard pass to Henning, who ran 20 yards more. A series of line plays sent the ball over for the only touchdown of the quarter.

With Beatty substituted for Captain Blake Miller, and McClellan working in Fick's place, the work of the Aggies improved, and they had marched 70 yards to Carroll's 4-yard line, when time for the period was called.

The last quarter saw a great awakening and three touchdowns were put across. For the Aggies, Smith, Deprato and Blacklock carried the heavy end of the attack with Heubel, Springer and Beatty adding substantial gains when called on.

Miller and Henning Off Color.

Considering the game as a whole, Captain Blake Miller and Henning were off color. One Carroll tackler caught the Aggie leader from behind and threw him for a loss. Jerry Deprato failed twice at drop-kicks for field goals, but kicked perfectly after touchdowns, getting eight in eight attempts.

On his second attempt at drop-kicking he sent the oval squarely against one of the goal posts from the 35-yard line.

Though the Aggies got away with three forward passes only two, Deprato to Henning, brought any substantial gains. A half dozen other passes failed, one of Heubel's flying squarely into the arms of Porlier. The Aggies' efforts at the opening of the game appeared weak and they resorted to line smashing when any yards were needed. Carroll got away with four passes in 12 tries. Macklin used 28 men in the game. Carroll players were forced to take time out repeatedly in the last two quarters, used only 14 men. Summary:
